World AMR Awareness Week (WAAW) -The National Event

S ri Lanka's National event for the World Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) Awareness Week (WAAW) was held on the 12th of December 2024 at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute.



WAAW is celebrated worldwide between the 18th and 24th of November, but due to the recent elections this celebration in Sri Lanka was moved to December. The Theme is Educate, Advocate and Act Now. AMR is one of the 15 core capacities of the International Health Regulations. The call is for a One Health Approach to create a meaningful impact, where the call is for all disciplines from Agriculture, Health, Livestock and Fisheries to come together to create, advocate, and develop action plans to mitigate AMR.

The National event was organized to summarise the activities in Sri Lanka. Officials from the Ministry of Health and Mass Media, Dept. of Agriculture, Dept. of Animal Production and Health, Ministry of Environment, National Aquatic Resources Research and Development Agency, WHO, Sri Lanka College of Microbiology were present. As the National Focal Point for Combating AMR in Sri Lanka, Dr. P.L. Athapattu, DDG/Laboratory Services of the Ministry of Health, opened the day's sessions.

He highlighted Sri Lanka's activities towards combatting AMR over the past year, and emphasized

the One Health approach, where humans, the environment, and the animals work together for the eco system and thus any activities that lead to AMR in any of these divisions can steam roll into the other.

The drivers of AMR are essentially the over-use and misuse of Antimicrobials (AM) in humans, livestock and fisheries and in the environment. The ease of international travel is another factor which drives the quick spread of AMR. It is important to note here that there has been continued innovation and production of stronger and stronger antimicrobials, but since the late 1990's the pipeline has become dry and there is a discovery void. GLASS data shows that the resistance of E. coli to 3rd generation cephalosporins stands at > 50% in Sri Lanka compared to around 10% in UK and 3% in Switzerland.

In the Livestock industry, growth promotion and the prophylactic use of AM in animals are banned since 2018, and hence AM use in this sector has been reducing. Many 3rd generation Cephalosporins too have been banned. Older tetracyclines and macrolides are mainly used for treatment in this sector.

In Aquatics and fisheries, as most consumable fisheries products are exported, there is strict compliance in AM use .. However, this is not the same for ornamental fish industry and there is worry that there will be spillover effects into the consumable fishery industry and water resources.

Sri Lanka's concerted efforts to combat AMR over the past year are :

 Securing the Fleming Fund of UK for the second time for £800,000 for 2024-2025, to strengthen One Health governance and data sharing, strengthen AMR and AMU surveillance system in

human health and in animal and environmental health.

- GO BLUE campaign with media briefing and activities on increasing awareness among decision makers, health officials, practitioners, hospitals, and the public on AMR.
- 3. School competitions to create awareness among public through kids art .
- 4. Burden assessment by extending the number of Sentinel sites to 25. Surveillance protocol created and information linked with GLASS AMR, WHONET, LIMS.
- 5. Prevention and control of infection via collaboration with the Ministry of Environment.
- Optimising the use of AMs AWaRe came into play, the AMR prescribing chart. AMR stewardship guidelines and circulars among health practitioners.
- 7. Research and innovation
- 8. Environmental safety through hospital wastewater surveillance, and antibiotic disposal in the country

Further, during the event we heard the presentations from the President of the College of Microbiologists, Dr Sujatha Pathirage, and officials from the Dept of Aquatic Resources and Dept of Livestock. The audience was also addressed by DDG, Dr Panapitiya and Director General of Health Services Dr Anil Jasinghe, as well as the WHO country representative.



Of note was the presentation by the Medical Superintendent of the Base Hospital Udugama who detailed all the activities of his hospital during the awareness week, including using separate blue colour prescriptions for antibiotics, childrens art competition and quizzes for the health care staff and awareness programs for health workers as well as the public.

Finally prizes were given for the medical faculty students who participated in quiz competitions and awareness video creations. Their work was showcased and they were very impressive and imaginative.


As Independent Health Practitioners we are an important guardian against AMR as we remain the first point of contact in most cases. By clearly refining our antibiotic use through the AWaRe prescribing chart and perhaps auditing the process along the way we can make a tremendous contribution to preventing AMR.

E stablishment of a Network with Member Associations of Organization of Professional Associations (OPA) for prevention of AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria was held on 28th November 2024 at the Auditorium of OPA.


The summary done by the IMPA Secretary *Dr Kanthi Ariyaratne* of the presentation done by *Dr Pramitha Shanthilatha* Director / National Programme for Tuberculosis Control is given below.

Tuberculosis Prevention

Dr Pramitha Shanthilatha speaking about the disease stated that Tuberculosis is an infectious disease caused by the bacterium called Mycobacterium tuberculosis. She further stated that 75% of all TB cases are pulmonary TB affecting the lungs whereas 25% of all TB cases are Extra Pulmonary TB affecting any other organs except hair and nail. She showed the categories of persons who are at higher risk of developing TB as contacts of pulmonary TB patients, healthcare workers, undernourished/malnourished personnel, immunocompromised patients and those who are on immunosuppressive therapy, patients with chronic diseases such as Diabetes and Chronic Kidney Diseases, elderly and institutionalized persons and displaced persons. She highlighted the TB situation in the country presenting the case distribution by districts including the... Resistance (RR) and Multi Drug Resistance (MDR) cases.



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
Distribution of TB cases by Districts - 2023

MDR and RR TB Cases




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Dr Pramitha Shanthilatha I highlighted the existing strategies for ending TB and appealed the different professionals to contribute to increasing case findings, preventing the emergence of new cases, promoting

early treatment seeking and managing TB / TB with co-morbidities targeting reduction of TB incidence and TB deaths.



Adopted version

The year-end introspection by Dr Ullas Mahesh highlights the relentless work ethic of many doctors and its consequences. Early in their careers, physicians and surgeons often prioritize clinical work to establish their identity and reputation, working tirelessly to build a name for themselves. Over time, this pursuit evolves into maintaining relevance amidst younger, equally competent professionals entering the field. Driven by ego, fear of losing patients, or competition, many doctors push themselves to the brink, believing they are indispensable to their patients. However, the reality is stark-patients move on to the next available "top doctor" without hesitation, even when their favoured doctor is unavailable or has passed away.

The obsession with work often comes at a steep cost, both tangible and intangible. Spouses bear the brunt of the doctor's stress-filled lifestyle, worrying about their health while receiving little acknowledgement for their support. Children, though provided with material comforts, miss out on the presence of their parents during crucial formative years. Ageing parents, too, worry about their children's well-being, adding to their stress. Most significantly, doctors themselves suffer, trading their health and personal time for punishing schedules. Overworking leads to neglected relationships, lost hobbies, and deteriorating physical and mental health. Dr. Mahesh emphasizes the irony of doctors advising patients on healthy lifestyles while failing to maintain their own.

Citing a young cardiologist's untimely death and the swift professional replacement that followed, Dr. Mahesh underscores a hard truth: doctors are replaceable in their profession but irreplaceable as family members. Reflecting on his own journey, he reveals his decision to retire from full-time practice on December 31, 2021. Now, he works only on his terms-limited hours with pre-pooled patients-while dedicating time daily to his passions, relationships, and health.

His message is clear: change before it's too late. Pursue balance, prioritize what truly matters, and avoid the regrets of a life spent solely in the pursuit of professional goals. "Physicians, heal thyself first!"
