# Establishment of a Network with Member Associations of Organization of Professional Associations (OPA) for prevention of AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria

#### Introduction

he event to establish a network with member associations of Organization of Professional Associations (OPA) was held with the coordination of Independent Medical Practitioners Association (IMPA) and with the sponsorship of Country Coordinating Mechanism Sri Lanka (CCMSL). This was the first event of such nature which was funded through the CCMSL. The event was held on 28th November 2024 at the Auditorium of OPA. There were nearly 60 participants from member organizations of the OPA as well as from professional groups who are closely associated with IMPA such as Primary Care Respiratory Group (PCRG) and Primary Care Diabetic Group (PCDG). This network of members will advocate and communicate to increase the knowledge, favorable attitudes and to bring sound practices in the prevention of HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria among members of relevant associations.

#### **Objectives**

The main Objective of this event was to establish a network with member associations of Organization

of Professional Associations (OPA) for prevention of AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. Specific Objectives of the event were to establish a network with representatives of member associations of OPA, to create awareness on HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria among the representatives of member associations of OPA and to obtain the services of those representatives as advocates and as communicators in creating awareness among the members of respective organizations.

#### **Resource Persons and Moderator**

The resource persons were Dr Vindya Kumarapeli Director/National STD/AIDS Control Programme, Dr Pramitha Shanthilatha Director / National Programme for Tuberculosis Control and Chest Diseases and Dr Pubudu Chulasiri Consultant Community Physician/Anti Malaria Campaign. Dr Kanthi Ariyarathne Executive Secretary/Oversight Officer CCMSL was the moderator.



#### **HIV / AIDS Prevention**

r Vindya Kumarapeli presenting the current trend and status of HIV/AIDS, priority areas in prevention & control and role of different professional groups in strengthening these activities highlighted that they are working to achieve the goal of ending the AIDS epidemic in Sri Lanka by 2030 as a public health burden. She further explained the difference


between HIV and AIDS as there were professionals other than the medical professionals at the meeting. Talking about the Epidemiology of HIV and AIDS in Sri Lanka she further said that Sri Lanka is still a low-risk country for the spread of HIV of which the prevalence is <0.1% in the general population whereas Adult HIV incident rate <0.01%

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
She highlighted the trends of HIV cases in 2020-2023 and stressed the point that men in the age group of 15 years or more are at most risk. Majority of females have got the HIV through heterosexual transmission

(97%). while majority of males were infected through male tomale transmission x (62% ). Mother to child transmission has been kept at zero since 2019.



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# Modes of Transmission 2023



Females-majority attributed to heterosexual transmission (97%, 78 cases) Males-majority is malenale sex (62%, 381 cases)

Highlighting the national response in prevention on HIV, she presented the 95-95-95 targets by 2025 and strategies they implement in collaboration with government, non-government and international stakeholders such as Family Health Bureau, Health Promotion Bureau, Directorate of Mental Health, Epidemiology Unit, Private Health Sector, Education and Higher Education Sectors including Vocational Training Centres, National Youth Service Council,

National Youth Corps, Tri-forces, Sri Lanka Police, Sri Lanka Bureau of Foreign Employment , Tourist industry, Social Service Department, Child protection Authority and National Dangerous Drug Control Board.One of the important points stated was that as Sri Lanka is a low prevalence country (< 0.1%) , most of the prevention activities are targeted on Key Population groups.

- Sex workers (21 times higher)
- Men Having sex with men (MSM) (22 times higher)
- Trans Gender (TG) (12 times higher)
- · People Who Inject Drugs (PWID) (21 times higher)
- Prison Inmates
- Beach boys

Finally, she highlighted the preventive strategies and the existence of a network of institutions which provide the free of charge services to the citizens of Sri Lanka all over the country and requested to advocate for using these facilities by anyone who need the services.

# **Prevention strategies**

- Limiting sexual intercourse to one faithful partner.
- Using a condom correctly and consistently when having sex.
- ➤ Adhere to Anti Retroviral treatment to control the viral load to undetectable level so that the onward sexual transmission is negligeable, U=U.
- Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis for people engage in high-risk behaviors such as MSM, TG
- Post Exposure Prophylaxis after high risk sexual and occupational exposure






# **Multisectoral meeting on TB Control**

Multi-sectoral meeting on TB Control was held at the Auditorium Ministry of Health on - 29<sup>th</sup> November 2024 IMPA was represented by Dr Sujatha Samarakoon.

- 1. Highlights of the meetingIncidence of TB in the country is increasing and NPTCCD is scaling up screening to find new cases. The gap between the estimate of new cases and actual cases must be narrowed. NPTCCD is seeking the support of private practitioners to screen suspected cases with symptoms as per the algorithm of NPTCCD (which is on the web site). A list of IMPA members is available with NPTCCD and when the referral form is in place they will share with the membership.
- The WHO Multi-stakeholder Framework (MSF) is being adopted by NPTCCD and an International Consultant has conducted key informant interviews and the report will be ready soon. The designations of KII were not mentioned.
- 3. Anti-TB drugs are available only through the Government Chest clinics and Private Practitioners should liaise with them when needed.
- 4. Gene X Pert machines are available in 32 TB clinics and a sputum PCR test can be done in these centres.

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### A Thief's Thanks

The short story A Thief's Thanks follows a retired expatriate who, preparing for a short trip to Western Europe with his family, contemplates the safety of his modest home in their absence. Concerned that a potential thief might vandalize the property out of frustration from finding no valuables, he leaves a thoughtful letter on the dining table along with a thousand rupees as a "gift."

The letter empathizes the hypothetical thief, acknowledging the hardships that may drive someone to crime. It candidly explains the lack of cash or valuables in the house and offers a slice of cake and juice from the fridge for sustenance. In an unexpected twist, the letter provides "tips" on wealthier targets in the building, identifying residents who are allegedly corrupt officials and public figures responsible for embezzling public funds and contributing to societal decay.

Upon returning from the trip, the expatriate discovers a surprise: the thief has not only spared the house but left behind 100,000 rupees, a note of thanks, and gifts including dried fruits, cardamom, and a chocolate cake. The thief expresses gratitude for the "profitable tips" that led to a successful heist and promises a continued partnership in undermining corrupt elites.

The story humorously critiques systemic corruption, juxtaposing the supposed morality of the thief with the exploitation by powerful officials. It blends wit, irony, and moral reflection, ultimately celebrating an unusual camaraderie between the protagonist and the thief, who emerges as a symbol of poetic justice against entrenched societal inequalities.


This year the World Diabetes Day's theme is Diabetes and Well-being. Among people living with diabetes, approximately 1/3 experience diabetes distress, 2/3 fear that complications are going to affect their wellbeing and 1/4 find it hard to remain positive in relation to their condition. With these statistics, and in our country where 1 in 4 adults are having diabetes, we need to look beyond blood sugar for a better diabetes life. Prevention is key, awareness and support are important
