IMPA Monthly E-Newsletter Guidelines

The Global Fund has built a long and productive relationship with Sri Lanka. From its inception, the Global Fund has provided funds to support the fight against HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria to strengthen health systems in Sri Lanka. Further, funds are allocated for Health Information Improvement and Quality Improvement (HIQI) and for the Covid-19 Response Mechanism (C19RM) as well. **Currently, there are three active grants in Sri Lanka, namely HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis / Covid-19 and Resilient Systems for Health-Project HIQI**.

IMPA is one of the civil society organizations representing the private sector at the Country Coordinating Mechanism, Sri Lanka (CCMSL), which is chaired by the Secretary Health and Mass Media. CCMSL forms an integral part of the Global Fund partnership, which brings a diverse group of stakeholders, including governmental organizations, civil society organizations and developmental partners to facilitate the implementation and monitoring of grants. The engagement of the private health sector is important in these health programs as a significant proportion of the Sri Lankan population is receiving the services through them, especially when seeking out patient care, and IMPA inclusion is to strengthen this collaboration further.

A 3-member Country Team from the Global Fund visited Sri Lanka from 24th to 28th March 2025. The Team comprised of Ms. Sylwia Murray - Fund Portfolio Manager, Mr. Luckson Sichamba, Specialist Health Product Management and Mr. Robert Cryer, Senior Manager, Country Digital Services.

The main areas the Mission focused on were:

- Implementation of the Grant Cycle 7(GC7) of TB and HIV grants
- Acceleration of the implementation of the Resilient SSH grant- Project Health Information and Quality Improvement (Project HIQI)
- Implementation of Covid 19 Response Mechanism (C19RM) investments.

Dr Sarath Samarage, who represents the IMPA at CCMSL participated in the Key Population Task Force Meeting held on 18th March and the CCMSL meeting held on 25th March 2025, which was organized during the Global Fund Mission.





Non-Consensual Sex Across All Ages in Both Sexes

C ompared to reported sexual violence against women, sexual violence against men and boys in Sri Lanka is underreported and inadequately documented. Rigid masculinity norms and gender stereotypes discourage male victims from coming forward, leading to a lack of awareness and response to this issue.

A study on teenage pregnancy conducted in 2012 (1) in a District in Sri Lanka highlights the prevalence of non-consensual sex. This study included three components: Component I: Pregnant adolescents (Sample: 450), Component II: Partners of pregnant adolescents (Sample: 150), and Component III: School adolescents (Sample: 2,020).

Data were collected using interviewer-administered questionnaires for pregnant adolescents and their partners and self-administered questionnaires for school adolescents. Ethical approval was obtained from the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) Ethical Review Committee.

Findings revealed that nearly a quarter (6/23) of sexually active schoolgirls and one-fifth (10/46) of sexually active schoolboys reported non-consensual initiation of sex (either unwanted or forced). Among pregnant adolescents, 4% reported non-consensual first intercourse, as did 1% of their partners.

Bivariate analysis indicated that male partners who were uncertain (n=24) or forced (n=2) in their first sexual experiences were more likely to report their adolescent partner's pregnancy as unplanned.

Multivariate analysis further showed that male partners who described the pregnancy as unplanned had three times the odds of experiencing non-consensual first intercourse. Similarly, underage pregnant adolescents were three times more likely to have experienced non-consensual first intercourse than older pregnant adolescents.

According to more recent available data, rape and sexual violence remain significant concerns in Sri Lanka, affecting diverse segments of the population. These data indicate 1,792 rape cases in 2018, 1,779 in 2019, 1,016 in 2020, and 1,377 in 2021 were reported. Alarmingly, in 2019, 84% (1,490) of reported cases involved children².

These findings further highlight that both males and females are vulnerable to sexual victimization, demonstrating the presence of non-consensual sex across all ages. The recent incident in Anuradhapura Hospital in Sri Lanka underscores the urgent need for enhanced safety measures and stronger policy interventions at all levels.



On 24 March 1882, German physician Robert Koch announced the discovery of the bacterium that causes tuberculosis (TB) - a date marked by #WorldTBDay today.

In the 1800s, it is estimated that the disease caused a quarter of all deaths in Europe. Koch's discovery opened the way for diagnosis and cure, and during the 1900s, the mortality rate declined drastically due to research and the introduction of antibiotics.

One of the founders of bacteriology, Koch was awarded the 1905 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for his discovery.




